The Christmas Cookie Massacre

I. Sentences

Find the complete subject and underline it once; underline the subject plus associated modifiers. Find the complete predicate and underline it twice; underline the main verb plus auxiliary verbs plus objects or complements plus associated modifiers. Every part of the sentence should be underlined one way or another (unless there is an interjection). 2 pt. each

- 1. Throughout the Christmas season, the Taylor family was preoccupied by hockey.
- 2. Eight children, two parents, and sundry spouses were especially involved in trading hockey cards.
- 3. Sporting three cards plus a stick of gum for fifty cents, a pack of trading cards was a bargain.
