# I, Me, Mine, Who, Whom, Whose, He, She, Him, Her, his, hers

This exercise sheet is concerned with case. Remember that nouns and pronouns are declined in one of three cases: subject (also called the subjective or nominative), object (also called objective), and possessive. Nouns have case, although they seldom display it unless in the possessive. Pronouns retain a measure of complexity in their declensions.

When pronouns serve as subjects or predicate nouns (which are grammatically equivalent to subjects), formal rule-based grammar demands that they be in the subject case.

When pronouns serve as direct objects, indirect objects, object complements, or objects of prepositions, they *must* be in the object case.

Use the appropriate case and number of the  $3^{rd}$  person personal pronoun (he, she, it).
