VERBALS

Verb forms that no longer function as main verbs, but rather as other parts of speech. Nevertheless, verbals retain some of their verb heritage and abilities.

Gerunds. Always end in -ing.

Always function as nouns

Form phrases with objects or complements and with

modifiers

Participles. End in -ing, -ed, -en,

and sometimes are completely irregular

Always function as adjectives

Form phrases with objects or complements and with

modifiers

Infinitives. Normally are signaled by "to" plus the verb form,

although sometimes the "to" is missing Function as nouns, adjectives, or adverbs

Form phrases with objects or complements and with

modifiers; also may have pseudo subjects (and if so, the

pseudo subject is in the object case)
